

# **Lesson: Character Facebook Profile**

Ages: 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade

# Character Improv

- Ask the participants to break up into pairs.
- Using the characters they just developed, give each pair a specific setting/situation and ask them to improvise a short scene as their characters. Encourage them to be bold and honest.

# **Drama Vocabulary:**

Character – who the actor is pretending to be

**Improvisation** – Acting without a written script; creating dialogue as you pretend to do the actions of the characters you are playing

**Profile** – a list of information about someone

Setting – where the story takes place
